Guffy and Bell responded to a call where a vehicle had crashed into a liquor store and a fire had started. They put out the fire, called for backup and the individual came out and was taken to the hospital. Off. Cummins came across a reported stolen car that he thought was empty. Two individuals were in the car and were suffering from an overdose. In total, six doses of Narcan were used to

revive the individuals. Both went to area hospitals. Without the quick thinking of these officers. the individuals involved may not be here today.

MIDDLETOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT

I want to remind everyone that if you need to speak to a Middletown Police officer or need to report a crime, please call the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office (JCSO) Dispatch at 502-574-5471. JCSO is responsible for our dispatching and radio calls, and they are the ones who will send an officer to you should you need to report an incident or accident. As always, if it is an emergency, you can dial 911 and they will immediately transfer you to JCSO dispatch.

As we transition from winter to spring, I would like to encourage everyone to be on the lookout for scams. Most recently there has been a telephone scam where the caller will tell you that you missed a court date or that you missed your jury duty. The caller will say they are from the local sheriff's office or police department and if you do not send in a deposit, a warrant will be issued. They will also tell you that the deposit will be refunded once you arrive at court for your case. This is all a very believable scam. Neither the sheriff's office

nor the police department will ask you for a deposit in any court proceedings. I would suggest you don't engage in conversations with them and block any telephone numbers or emails they use. I personally know of several folks



that were almost scammed this way. They will try to tempt you with information such as your home address and family member names, this is all information that anyone can get from the internet. This is but only one of the many examples of telephone and email scams that are occurring across the nation and are alive and well here in Middletown. If you have any questions, you can contact the Kentucky State Attorney General's Office Fraud Division at 502-696-5648.

The thefts of mail from mailboxes have slowed down but are still occurring across our city. I recommend that

if you are mailing any financial documents such as checks, money orders, or gift cards, please deposit those directly at the mail drop box inside a post office branch. The blue United States Post Office boxes are not as secure as they once were. Again, I recommend you drop your mail directly inside the



post office, as this will greatly reduce your chances of becoming a victim of fraud.

Lastly, the most common complaint we receive is the amount of traffic on our roads, and the blatant disregard for traffic laws.

The amount of traffic on our roads is a by-product of growth in both residential and retail establish-



ments. Although there is very little the police department can do about the number of vehicles on the roadway, we can help to correct the behavior of those vehicles on the road. I would like to introduce you to our two traffic officers. First is Officer Ken Christian, who retired from the Louisville Metro Police Department and worked in their traffic unit for many years. Officer Christian is a senior accident investigator and heads up our traffic unit. Next, is Officer Michael Cummins, who comes to us from the University of Louisville Police Department, and is in school to learn the ins and outs of accident investigation. These two traffic officers not only investigate traffic accidents, hit and run accidents, and conduct traffic enforcement, they monitor areas that are heavily traveled and bring to the city suggestions on how to make roadways and intersections safer. You can help make their jobs easier by paying attention to the traffic laws and be hyper-vigilant at intersections. Most accidents could be avoided if drivers would pay attention to the roadway and not distracted by other influences such as cellphones or even other occupants in the vehicle.

My officers and I take pride in our city. With your help, we can make Middletown a safer, more enjoyable place to live, raise our families, and work. If you have any suggestions or comments, please feel free to let us know.

DID YOU KNOW

Kentucky Insurance policyholders often have questions about the taxes that show up on their insurance premium notices. Where does this tax go? A portion of that tax comes right here to Middletown. The insurance premium tax is an important source of revenue for the local govern-



ments even though it is generally one of the least known of all the local taxes. You pay an insurance premium tax on most all of the insurance policies you purchase, auto, home, boat, even your life insurance policies.

Insurance companies are required to pay this premium tax to the city, county

or municipality that you live in, like Middletown! The City of Middletown then uses the insurance revenue to keep your City operating, safe and looking beautiful! Your return on this revenue is seen through street lights throughout Middletown, sidewalks, road repair, snow removal, garbage/recycling for residents and 24hr police protection. Without this insurance revenue Middletown would not be able to offer all of the benefits you and I enjoy.

Please contact your insurance agent/broker and make sure they have your insurance policy coded for Middletown so the money goes to Middletown. You have to pay the tax regardless, why not make sure it is coming to the town where you live, work, and play!



Are you ready to file your Quarterly Withholdings?

In August 2023, the Middletown City Commission passed an ordinance creating an annual business license fee of \$50 and an occupational tax. Nearly 800 businesses have registered. **Thank you!**

There are still a few businesses in Middletown that have not yet complied and we are working diligently to gain compliance

working diligently to gain comp to create a level field for all.

If you have not registered your business, you can do so by calling City Hall at 502-245-2762 and ask for Ann Kaiser.

In January 2024, Middletown businesses were required to begin withholding a 1% occupational tax for work performed in Middletown. The first quarterly payment is due by April 30, 2024. If you are a business and need to register and file, please contact Ann Kaiser at 502-245-2762.

A BIT OF MIDDLETOWN HISTORY

JOSHUA FRY LAWRENCE FAMILY

When Edith Wood published her book Middletown Days and Deeds in the 1940's she left us with the only concisely written volume of facts about the city and its early settlers –facts that



even then
were being
lost to time
and
memory.
In the
chapter
"Founders,
Settlers and

Old Families" she talks about the Lawrence family and head of the Lawrence family, Lieutenant Benjamin Lawrence, a veteran of the Revolutionary War, who settled in the area of what is now the University of Louisville Shelby Campus and is buried on the property. His children intermarried with other old Middletown families, so Edith's text is filled with descendants' names as well.

Joshua Fry Lawrence, 1827-1894, married his cousin Urith Lawrence Pope, daughter of Patrick Henry Pope and Sarah Lawrence Brown. The couple owned land in the area now occupied by the Willow Wood subdivision.

Their children were: Sarah Pope Lawrence, Thomas E. Lawrence, Mary G. Lawrence, Bettie H. Lawrence and Julia L. Lawrence.


In 2009 an incredible gift of portraits to the Middletown Museum from the estate of Leslie Tichenor, whose husband was the well-known interior decorator Scott Tichenor, these descendants would have remained just names in a book. Scott Tichenor was a Lawrence descendant. Important as these original paintings are, they are only a small part of the Tichenor collection of daguerreotypes, tintypes, and photographs of other descendants as well as genealogical charts, maps and biographical records that Scott researched and collected over the decades.

In June of 1934, descendants of the Lawrence, Womack and Beynroth families were present for the exhumation of the graves at the cemetery located at the brow of Douglass Hill. This land had been part of the Lawrence family property. The cemetery consisted of a rock wall enclosure



that contained the graves of J. Fry Lawrence and Urith Lawrence Pope with the graves of the Womack and Beynroth families outside the walls. The Lawrence remains were buried in a private family graveyard on Browns Lane in St. Matthews. The Womack and Beynroth remains were buried in the Middletown Cemetery.
