

From the desk of Chief Rob Herman

I want to first start off this newsletter by thanking all the residents that have contacted us regarding suspicious vehicles and people wandering our streets during the odd hours of the night. By notifying us of these individuals, we can respond quickly and prevent crime in our city. As a reminder, if you see something out of the ordinary or suspicious, don't hesitate to call us; our dispatch number is 502-574-5471. We are dispatched through the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office (JCSO), so don't be confused when they answer the phone that way.

Also, if you need to speak with an officer, or have an officer respond, please call 502-574-5471 and the friendly dispatchers will make sure your needs are addressed. A common misconception is that our police station is physically staffed 24/7, however that is not true after normal business hours and weekends, so save that number in your phone or post it on your refrigerator. In any emergency, you can still dial 911 and you will be transferred to the JCSO dispatch.

While on the topic of helping us out, we also appreciate you sharing your security camera footage with us when you feel it has caught something or someone suspicious. You never know, you may have a tip that can help solve crime in your neighborhood. The Middletown Police Department also has an anonymous tip line if you want to leave information about a crime that you have knowledge of, that number is 502-755-4MPD (502-755-4673).

Crime trends that I want you to be aware of include in -person, telephone, email, and on-line scams. Most of these scams are complicated, detailed, and only have one goal – that is to separate you from your hard-earned money by means of fraud. Be aware that these scams may seem legit; that's why they are so successful. But if you keep your guard up and ask a lot of questions, you can deter their attacks. Be suspicious – ask for details and challenge the information that is being presented to you – use common sense. I don't know of any business or government agency that will ask you to pay for services with gift cards. So, the

next time someone calls you and says you owe them money and they want you to buy gift cards to pay, I can guarantee it's a scam. Also, if you receive a



call that you have a warrant, or your child or grand-child is arrested, ask for verification without giving them any personal information – trust me, if you have an outstanding warrant, we already have all the necessary information about you that we need! Be aware that these folks can also spoof telephone numbers; your caller ID may say it's your utility company calling or the Internal Revenue Service, but in fact it is not. Just tell them you will call them back after you look up the number yourself.

Another issue affecting us all is mail theft. Criminals are breaking into home mailboxes as well as the blue postal service drop boxes and looking for checks that you have written. The checks are then washed of the amount and payee; then the criminals just add whatever amount they choose and whom to pay it to and can cash it like any other check. You usually don't find out until it is too late: first, your account is missing more money than you planned and then the business you wrote the check to never receive it, thus your payment is missing. Simple tactics to use to protect your checks is to use a special check writing pen that is extremely hard to wash off your checks. These pens can be found on Amazon or contact your bank for suggestions. Another tip is to physically drop any mail with checks in it directly inside the local post office, do not use the blue drop boxes outside. Most all post offices have a drop box inside the building, available 24 hours a day. If that is too troublesome, then consider setting up auto-pay or on-line payments to your most used accounts such as LG&E, Louisville Water, cable, and internet services. Being proactive now will save you a lot of headaches in the future.

I want to end by wishing you a safe and enjoyable

summer. Get out and meet your neighbors! By developing good relationships with those that live around you, you can look out for one another and soon the word will spread to the would-be criminals to stay away from your neighborhood because you have established a strong block watch.

MIDDLETOWN PROPERTY TAX

Pay before November 1, 2023 to receive a 15% discount!

You should receive your 2023 Middletown property tax bills by September 15, 2023. You can now obtain tax information: middletownky.igovservices.com

With the online tax payment software, you can perform any of the following actions and more:

Make payments by credit card or check

Print tax bill

View payment history

See property assessment

Online Tax Payment instructions

You do not have to create an account to view or pay online. Simply click in the "Search" at the top of the next screen, above the City's logo and click "Property Tax."

In the next search box enter your PIDN (parcel number) from your bill, enter the whole number, DO NOT INCUDE DASHES, include any zeros before or after the number. If you do not have your PIDN you may search by name or property address.

Click on the blue parcel number to view your




