MIDDLETOWN PROPERTY TAX

Pay before November 1, 2022 to receive a 15% discount!

You should have received your 2022 Middletown property tax bills for 2022. You can now obtain tax information on our city website at www.cityofmiddletownky.org

With the online tax payment software, you can perform any of the following actions and more:

Make payments by credit card or check Print tax bill

View payment history See property assessment

Online Tax Payment instructions

Click on the "Make a Payment" button at the top of the screen

You do not have to create an account to view or pay online. Simply click in the "Search" at the top of the next screen, above the City's logo and click "Property Tax."

In the next search box enter your PIDN (parcel number) from your bill, enter the whole number, DO NOT INCUDE DASHES, include any zeros before or after the number. If you do not have your PIDN you may search by name or

property address.

Click on the blue "Parcel Number" to view your account.

Click the green "Actions" drop down menu. From the actions menu you can make a payment, view history or view/print your bill.

Payments can also be mailed to: City of Middletown 11803 Old Shelbyville Road Middletown, KY 40243

Please return the remittance on the bottom of your bill and write your PIDN number on your check.

Please do not staple, or tape your check to the remittance, send the original bill not a copy, it will disable the barcode.

There is a locked drop box on the outside of City Hall for residents that want to drop off payments after hours.



Adoptive use of Historic Property Benjamin Franklin Morse House

Most preservationists agree that it is unrealistic to expect old buildings to be maintained permanently for their original use. What happens when a prime historic property is in the middle of commercial opportunities? All too often the old building is condemned to the bull-dozer and replaced with parking lots or modern commercial buildings.

Mr. Frank Otte was faced with that problem when he purchased the old Morse Place at 12902 Shelbyville Road. It was not feasible to keep the old farm house, which pre-dates the civil war, as a private residence. He considered tearing it down and replacing it with a modern building suitable for his business. After studying the matter, he felt it did contribute to the over-all image of Middletown and did not make sense to destroy such a

fine old structure.

Otte incorporated the building into his master plan and built his nursery center in the rear of the historic home. He was able to rent the first floor as a gift shop while his offices were on the second floor.

The house was built by Benjamin Franklin Morse in the

early nineteenth century. It is said that Morse hid his best horses in the house when confederate forces visited the area seeking new mounts. After searching the barns, the troopers left without replacement mounts as they did not consider looking for horses in the house.

Like many of Middletown's older buildings, it has been modified several times over the years. You can imagine the previous owners planning for more room as they prepared for additions to the family.



WINTER FIRE SAFETY TIPS FOR THE HOME

With winter close upon us now is a good time to have your furnace checked by a certified specialist to make sure it is running properly and there are no cracks emitting fumes into your home.

Many people also use fireplaces, wood burning stoves, space heaters and kerosene heaters. All are acceptable, however, if not used properly they can cause a house fire.

For Kerosene heaters, use only the fuel recommended by the manufacturer and avoid overfilling. Always refuel outside and never use a fuel burning appliance without proper room venting as it may lead to deadly fumes.

For fireplaces and wood burning stoves, make sure they are installed properly with proper floor support and protection. Have adequate clearance (36 inches) from combustible surfaces. Have the chimney inspected annually and cleaned as

necessary, especially if it has not been used in a while.

Do not use flammable liquids to start your fire and minimize the use of paper to build a roaring fire as it is possible to ignite creosote in the chimney.

Never burn charcoal indoors as it can give off lethal amounts of carbon monoxide.

Never go to bed without making sure that the fire in the fireplace or wood stove is out. Do not close your damper with hot ashes in the fireplace.

Always discard old ashes in a metal container outside and well away from your home or garage.

If using an electric space heater, be sure not to overload the circuit and

avoid using an extension cord.

Make sure that every level of your home has a working smoke detector and check it monthly to make sure it is in operating order.

EXERCISE YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE ELECTION DAY IS TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 8

Things to know about election day:

- * Last Day to register to vote for the General Election is October 11, 2022. Register online at: www.govoteky.com
- * In person, excused and absentee early voting days are October 26-28 and October 31—November 2 at the Jefferson County Board of Elections located at 1000 East Liberty
- * Request an absentee, mail in ballot at: elections.jeffersoncountyclerk.org
- * In person, no excuse absentee early voting is November 3—5. There are seven locations in Jefferson County. Check: elections.jeffersoncountyclerk.org for those locations
- * November 8 in person voting is 6am—6pm at various polling locations. Check elections.jeffersoncountyclerk.org for your voting location

IMPORTANT!

Middletown residents must request a Middletown ballot before voting.

Your Middletown ballot will have your precinct number and MID such as F167-MID. The Middletown precincts are: D168, D169, F153, F158, F167, F176, F188. F189, V118, V120 and V127.
